

Keynote Lecture: “Reductionism in Economics: Causality and Intentionality in the Microfoundations of Macroeconomics”.

Kevin D. Hoover joined Duke University in 2006 as Professor of Economics and Philosophy. He was previously professor and chair of the Economics Department of the University of California, Davis.

A graduate of the College of William and Mary, he received his doctorate from the University of Oxford. He developed his interest in applied macroeconomics early in his career while working at the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco. Before moving to Duke, Hoover taught economics at the University of California, Davis, and at Oxford. He is the author of *The New Classical Macroeconomics* (Blackwell, 1988), *Causality in Macroeconomics* (Cambridge University Press, 2001), *The Methodology of Empirical Macroeconomics* (Cambridge University Press, 2001), and *Applied Intermediate Macroeconomics* (Cambridge University Press 2012) as well as nine edited volumes and more than 100 academic articles on macroeconomics, monetary economics, econometrics, the methodology and philosophy of economics, and the history of economic thought.

He is past chairman of the *International Network for Economic Method*, the past president of the *History of Economics Society* and a former editor of the *Journal of Economic Methodology*. He is currently the editor of the journal *History of Political Economy* (HOPE) and a Fellow of the Center for the History of Political Economy at Duke University.

Hoover’s teaching and research interests include monetary economics and macroeconomics, econometric search algorithms, causal modeling, the methodology of economics and the philosophy of science applied to economics, and the history of economics.
